

**BOYS****K to Grade 8**

**Shirt** – Monogrammed white knit golf shirt (long or short sleeves) with regular bottom to be worn throughout the year. All buttons are to be buttoned.

**Slacks** – Navy blue dress pants. No Bugle Boys, jeans, or similar styles.

Pants must resemble those sold at Rose’s or Flynn & O’Hara uniform shops.

**Belt** – All boys must wear a belt.

**Sweater** – Solid navy blue v-neck pullover or vest with monogram; the vest is to be worn as part of the winter uniform. No other color sweater, sweatshirt may be worn during the day.

**Shoes** – Black tie dress shoes with non-marking soles similar to styles available at Trevoise Family Shoes. Black sneakers are not acceptable.

**Socks** – Navy dress socks.

**GIRLS****K to Grade 4**

Plaid uniform jumper with light blue blouse (long or short sleeves). All buttons are to be buttoned.

**Grade 5 to 8**

Plaid uniform skirt with monogrammed white knit golf shirt (long or short sleeves) with regular bottom. All shirt buttons are to be buttoned.

**K to Grade 8**

**Sweaters** – Solid navy blue v-neck pullover or vest with monogram or cardigan is to be worn as part of the winter uniform. No other color sweater, sweatshirt may be worn during the day.

**Socks** – Navy blue knee highs or navy blue tights.

**Shoes** – Navy blue tie shoes with non-marking soles similar to style sold at Trevoise Family Shoes.

**Headbands** – Those that match the uniform, navy or light blue only may be worn.

**GYM UNIFORM**

All children – Navy blue sweat pants (sweat shorts in fall and summer: jersey knit or mesh);

SJB regular or SJB Bulldog Navy sweatshirt or navy t-shirt.

Regular sneakers with white ankle socks.

**N.U.T. Pass Dress Code**

You may come “dressed down” or “dressed up”! We ask that you wear an outfit appropriate to the school setting. Jeans are permitted (not with “holes” in them!), as are sweats or t-shirts with appropriate logos, words, etc. Tops that show “midriff skin” are not acceptable. Your safety is a r priority, therefore we ask that you do not wear flip-flops or shoes with a high heel.

## **Hair Style**

Boys' hair should not overlap the shirt collar nor come down into the eyes, but be neatly groomed at all times.

Girls' hair should not come into the eyes; it can be held back with a headband or scrunchie.

## **Jewelry**

Girls may wear one pair of small post earrings in the ear lobe.

Rings, bracelets, chains, other necklaces are not appropriate for school. A medal or cross on a chain may be worn under the uniform blouse/shirt.

Nail polish, French Tip nails are not permitted at any time.

**This slightly revised Uniform Dress Code will be effective immediately and enforced beginning Monday, September 24, 2007.**

Dear Parents,

It is my hope that the information on this sheet helps you to know what our expectations are for the Dress Code of our students. These have been explained to the children already, but we know that it will be helpful for you to be aware of them as well. As was said to the children, there is appropriate dress for the mall, movies, shopping, etc. – and appropriate dress for school. We are trying to help them make the correct choices for where they are and what they are doing – a skill they will use the rest of their lives!

If a student is “out of uniform,” s/he will be given a verbal warning. A written warning will be given next; if necessary, a second written warning will be issued. At the third written warning, the student will also be given a detention with sufficient notice to you so you can arrange for transportation.

There has been a tremendous amount of cooperation shown in the short time we've been in school. It is also our hope that this spirit of cooperation will extend to this area as well!
